

Pianist ANDREW COOPERSTOCK has a World Premiere recording (Bridge Records) of Stephen Sondheim's A Little Night Music: Suite for Violin and Piano, arr. Eric Stern, with William Terwilliger, and a world premiere performance of A Little Night Music at 54 Below (NYC) as part of a Leonard Bernstein/Stephen Sondheim program. "I performed Beethoven's Choral Fantasy with the Denver Philharmonic, and I've recently become president of the Colorado Music Teachers Association."

I particularly enjoyed leading the Maryland Lyric Opera Company Orchestra in Turandot and Don Carlo performances as well as The Marriage of Figaro, at the Clarence Smith Center for the Performing Arts at the University of MD at College Park. 
GILA GOLDSTEIN, pianist (Boston), reports that in addition to her October performances for Sonus-IMF 2021, she performed Bartok's 15 Hungarian Peasant Songs for the American Liszt Society Festival, gave a solo recital and master class at the James Madison University, VA, and a solo recital at Palm Beach Atlantic University in Florida. Most recently, she taught and performed at summer music festivals in the Amalfi Coast in Italy, the High Peaks in the Berkshires, and led a master class for BU at the Tanglewood Institute. The last year has seen a return to traveling for ANDREW GERLE, composer/pianist (NYC), who is juggling multiple theater and recording projects. He is nearing the completion of arrangements for the album Songs My Mother Taught Me, with San Francisco-based cellist Jennifer Kloetzel, original transcriptions of vocal music by Rachmaninoff, Strauss, Brahms, Guastavino, Debussy, and more. He has been back and forth to Sicily, working on an album of his original musical Whisper Darkly with one of the greatest electro-swing arrangers in the world and recording with local jazz musicians. He has also returned to work as theater orchestrator, completing a show for Chinese composer Cecilia Lin, and will soon begin orchestrating a new show about silent screen star Rudolph Valentino. www.andrewgerle.com

Pianist **DANIEL GLOVER** writes from San Francisco, "Covid gave me the impetus to focus on learning pieces I wouldn't have learned otherwise. To celebrate the 100th anniversary of Saint-Saëns' death. I learned all 18 of Saint-Saëns' Etudes and recorded them. It was a deeply satisfying experience -refreshing to learn fugues from a romantic composer, as you don't get to play virtuoso octaves in a Bach fugue. Once in public again, I performed his Concertos Nos. 2 and 4 with organ accompaniment. I also watched over 80 operas from the Met Opera broadcasts! I gave an all-American recital after July 4th, performing Gottschalk, Barber, Rzewski, Gershwin, and short pieces by Dave Brubeck and David Guion — the cowboy composer."



Pianist **ENRIQUE GRAF** was featured soloist with the Montevideo, Uruguay Philharmonic Orchestra in Beethoven's Concerto No. 4, and with the National Symphony Orchestra of Colombia, performing George Gershwin's Concerto in F. He presented recitals in Punta del Este and at the Auditorio Nacional de Uruguay with violinist Daniel Lasca, performing works by Clara Schumann and Claude Debussy and Franz Liszt's Sonata in B minor. The Beethoven Piano Society of Europe, at St. James Piccadilly in London, featured him performing works by Mozart, Beethoven, and Liszt. Later this year, he returns to perform Mozart Concerto No. 13, K. 415 with the Montevideo Philharmonic. www.enriquegraf.com

The pandemic changed us forever. I kept my compositional "muscle" (so to speak) by writing tonal fugues and atonal fugues for one and two pianos. When the pandemic showed signs of letting up, I needed a change. I'm now on leave as a Fulbright scholar in Brazil. It has been a transforming experience for my family. "

PABLO LAVANDERA, pianist (NYC), writes, "Summer 2021 marked my return to concertizing, with duo-partner Evelyn Ulex, in our Transatlantic Piano Duo. After NY, we presented back-to-back performances at Stony Brook University. Other collaborations include a performance with violinist Joanna Huang at Carnegie's Weill Recital Hall. Pianist Moshe Knoll and I performed Dvorak in March at the Bohemian National Hall in NYC. A full Argentine music program titled Buenos Aires in the Berkshires is coming up, including two of Guastavino's transcriptions by our own Andrew Gerle, with cellist Kate Dillingham.

EXECUTIVE BOARD

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Pianist SANGHIE LEE writes from Korea, "I resumed meeting audiences through the virtual Korean Channel-News post-10th-anniversary concert talk series in March 2021, from the US. Once we returned to live performances, two other piano faculty at the U. of North Georgia and I planned a fun recital, "Traveling Around the World," which included repertoire from Eastern and Western Europe, Asia, and America. The first performance at UNG in October 2021 was so successful that we later performed at other universities. At my November 2021 recital at UNG, I selected a program to share, Joy & Sorrow, knowing we've all experienced big life changes during the pandemic. I'll never forget the interaction with the in-person audience in that recital. In June, I was deeply grateful to meet my Korean audience."

In addition to the premieres of new instrumental pieces, I was also pleased to have my music performed by the Boston Pops and Present Music. This project was showcased at the Chamber Music America National Conference in January, and we'll be touring together in spring. I'm teaching and performing at Songfest this summer. FERNANDO VIANI, pianist, writes from Bern, Switzerland, "Last year, GUILLERMO ANZORENA and I recorded songs by Guastavino and Piazzolla, and the second Ginastera Sonata for German Radio SWR2. In May, we presented a live concert at the same radio as part of the Schwetzingen Festival, performing songs by Carlos Guastavino, Hugo Wolf, Henri Duparc, and Claude Debussy. The concerts may be heard at the SWR2 site. Right now, Guillermo is touring with the Vokal Ensemble Stuttgart. Our big project - recording Guastavino's music - is on the horizon. In May '22, I performed a solo program dedicated to Argentine composers. In the 2nd half of '22, I'll perform Messaien's quartet for the end of times at the Bern Musik Festival."

FROM OUR COMPETITION FINALISTS

GABRIEL ABEDI, I Prize: Carlos Guastavino
International CC '21, writes from Italy, "My violin and piano work Song of Joy will be published this fall, as a result of my 2021 award from the US composition competition "Celebrating Diversity in Strings' Composition." Most recently, I finished Eweland Rhapsody, for orchestra and large percussion section (9 percussionists!) — a long and difficult but beautiful journey. This piece is the result of my long study of the music of the Ewe people of Ghana -- work I plan to continue in my quest to discover the musical traditions of my country, elevating them through my music."

BRACHA BDIL, II Prize shared, writes from Israel, "A few of my compositions won 1st prize, among them, In Memory of Voices for chamber ensemble, at the Maestros Vision Awards International Composition Competition, China. In 2021 I received first prize in the Orchestra Category for Mediterranean Suite for Symphony Orchestra and in the Chamber Music category for In a Folk Style at the "Donne In Musica" XVIII Composition Competition in Belgrade. In March, a concert dedicated to my works took place in Israel."

INCI YAKAR BIROL, **II Prize** *shared*, writes from Turkey, "Apart from completing my CD-Album Homage to Saygun, I served as a jury member for the second time at the Euplayy International Piano Competition, in which two of my students received Ultimate Prizes.
