

News from Sonus Artists

José Miguel Cueto (USA)

José sold his 1920 Stefano Scarampella concert violin, and found a new partner, a 1910 Carlo Carletti violin. He is greatly looking forward to sharing its voice with audiences in future performances.

Andrew Gerle (USA)

Andrew finished a unique semester at the Manhattan School of Music, teaching and serving as musical director for a brand new movie musical, filmed and recorded by students in isolation. He also finished a commission for NY-based Mirror Voices Ensemble of a new work for two voices and piano, Mind Reader. Andrew is on the 2021 competition committee.

Lilia Salsano (Argentina)

In December 2020, Lilia released her latest CD on Spotify, <u>"Poesia</u>," with compositions by Carlos Guastavino. Lilia is the Sonus contact in Argentina.

Salvatore Sclafani (Italy, Belgium)

Salvatore has been preparing an article about Ginastera, piano performance and Argentinian folk elements for an online academic review, under the patronage of the French Ministry of Culture. Fernando Viani (Germany)

In October 2020, Fernando traveled to Cyprus to adjudicate the Avantgarde Piano Competition. In November, his students performed virtually at the Beethoven Festival, held at the Konservatorium Bern. The Festival closed with the participation of the Konservatorium Faculty. Fernando and his colleague, pianist/composer Nazanin Piri, premiered her work titled "Vier Bruchstücke zu Beethoven" for two pianos. Fernando is the Sonus contact in Germany.





Back to the heart of music

Gabriella Cavallero, Associate Producer

This past year was a whirlwind – a storm of roller-coaster emotions, scares, disappointments, and also surprises, inspiration, and unexpected invention. I am deeply passionate and devoted to the arts – I'm an actor, director, dialect coach, and teacher – and our world of performing, telling stories together on stages and sharing them with audiences was shockingly rocked to its core. As many of you know, the performing arts suffered deeply during this time and entire seasons at theatres, symphony halls, opera houses, and dance companies around the world went dark. Artists and all the people involved in the performing arts were left completely out of work and, after an initial panic, had to be hugely inventive in order to survive this interminably long dry spell.

I personally went from feeling like I needed to help uplift and encourage my friends to continue creating, to not wanting to get out of bed and wanting nothing to do with zoom performances of any kind. I discovered that everything I do is extremely body-based and that without physical contact and proximity, the work and teaching I love so much feels very empty. Then I was invited to do several virtual projects and I saw that those 'shows' brought many people in homes all over the country a lot of joy. In the midst of this odd time, I went back to my musical roots – having grown up with musicians and being surrounded with music 24/7. I will always argue that nothing reaches the heart like music. And as an artist, that's what I seek to do the most, to open hearts. So when I was asked to help create a music festival to spread the music that I grew up listening to, crying to, and being joyfully inspired by, I said YES.

In only a few months, some fast magic happened to create the Sonus Festival. Long trips were made from country to country to unite duos, crash courses in self-recording had by all, myriad interviews recorded to share stories about Guastavino and our festival artists around the world. Executive Director and pianist Alejandro Cremaschi then masterfully edited hours upon hours of puzzle pieces into seven festival nights that made us very proud. How we did it Behind the Scenes of a Virtual Music Festival Aleiandro Cremaschi. Executive Director

This past October we at SONUS had the pleasure to present our first online Festival that focused on the life, work and music of the outstanding Argentine composer Carlos Guastavino. With the participation of 17 artists and musicians from around the world, and in seven consecutive days, SONUS broadcasted pre-recorded concerts, interviews and a panel via Facebook and YouTube to enthusiastic audiences world-wide. For many, these broadcasts were their first contact with the inspiring beauty of Guastavino's music.

Creating these broadcasts demanded significant work from all of us: long planning meetings, learning and recording the music under difficult circumstances created by the pandemic, putting together an attractive website and all the graphic material from scratch, planning and conducting interviews with each participating artist, creating Facebook advertising campaigns, and, last but not least, many, many hours of video editing, proof-reading and subtitling.

How did we manage to put it all together? What motivated these 17 artists to embark on this project? The answer is simple: we all believe in the power of music and the arts, and how important they are in these trying times. We are all passionate about sharing this higher call, and refuse to let adversity lessen our passion. In fact, at least for me, this past Festival represented a high point of 2020, a time when I felt truly "me" again, in a year full of anxiety and uncertainty.

Constantino "Tino" Bastidas – Tango Dancer Born in Huancayo, Peru Died in Arlington, VA, age 65












